With the point of departure in Zimbabwe's colonial history, *A matter of* difference? analyses how reproductive decision-making relates to discourses of race, sexuality and gender, and on what grounds Zimbabwean men and women make reproductive decisions. Feminist theories, as well as theories of fertility decline are explored in the search for a theoretical framework, which may help us understand the Zimbabwean situation, which seems to contradict conventional theories on fertility decline. The main conclusions of the thesis are, that the historical background has consequences for contemporary practices and discourses on sexuality and reproduction; that women's dependency on men is under-theorised in theories of fertility change; and that gender equality and economic growth are not necessarily required for setting a trend of fertility decline in motion.

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
